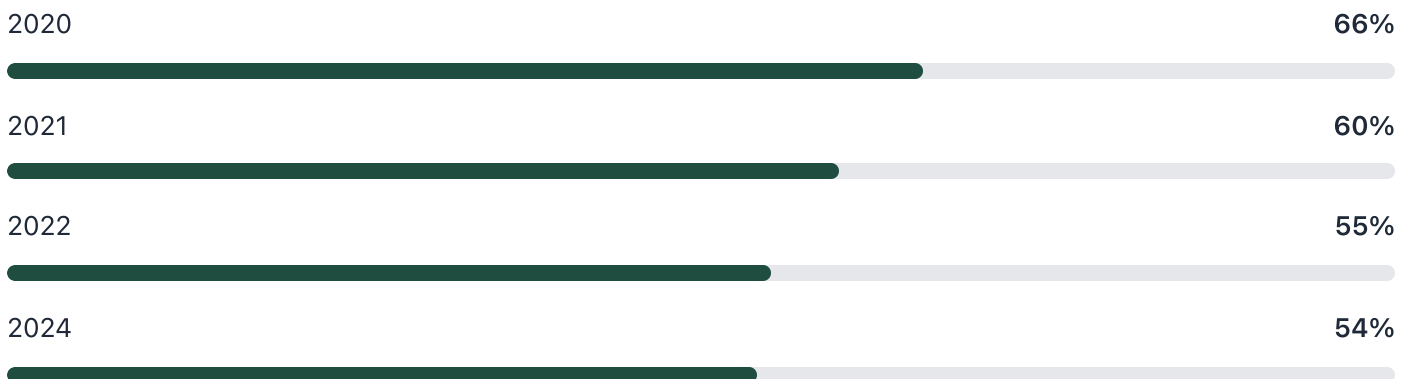

- Confidentiality in multi-agency contexts

#### The School-Based Trap

## Domain G: Behavior-Change Procedures (14%)

25 questions — The largest single domain.

### Key Topics:

- Reinforcement and punishment procedures
- Extinction and differential reinforcement
- Stimulus control procedures
- Conditioning procedures
- Shaping, chaining, and prompting

### Study Strategy:

Know the technical definitions AND be able to identify procedures in applied scenarios. The exam often describes a situation and asks which procedure is being used—or which would be most appropriate.

#### SAMPLE QUESTION FORMAT

A therapist provides verbal praise every time a child uses appropriate greetings. After several sessions, the child begins greeting others independently. Which procedure best describes what occurred?

- A. Negative reinforcement
- B. Positive reinforcement
- C. Response cost
- D. Extinction

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**Answer: B** — Praise (stimulus added) following behavior (greeting) increased the behavior's future frequency.

## Domain B: Concepts and Principles (14%)

24 questions — Tests your foundational knowledge.

### Key Topics:

- Respondent and operant conditioning
- Schedules of reinforcement
- Stimulus control concepts
- Motivating operations
- Verbal behavior

### Study Strategy:

This domain requires precise understanding of terminology. Know the difference between similar concepts (e.g., SD vs. S-delta, EO vs. AO). Create comparison charts for easily confused terms.

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## Domain E: Ethics (13%)

22 questions — Often underestimated by candidates.

### Key Topics:

- BACB Ethics Code for Behavior Analysts
- Professional boundaries and dual relationships
- Informed consent and assent
- Confidentiality
- Supervision responsibilities

### Study Strategy:

Read the actual BACB Ethics Code—don't just rely on summaries. Practice identifying which code section applies to scenario questions. Many questions present a gray area situation and ask for the MOST ethical response.

**School-Based Warning**

Many ethics questions involve scenarios outside school settings—private practice billing disputes, clinic-based dual relationships, or insurance documentation. Don't skip these because they're unfamiliar.

## Domain C: Measurement (12%)

21 questions — Often the weakest area for school-based candidates.

### Key Topics:

- Measurement procedures (frequency, duration, latency, IRT)
- Data display and graphing conventions
- Interobserver agreement (IOA) calculations
- Data interpretation

### Study Strategy:

Practice actual calculations. Know how to calculate IOA using different methods (total count, exact agreement, interval-by-interval). Be able to identify graphing errors and interpret visual data correctly.

#### SAMPLE QUESTION FORMAT

Observer A recorded 45 instances of the target behavior. Observer B recorded 50 instances. Using total count IOA, what is the agreement percentage?

- A. 85%
- B. 90%
- C. 95%
- D. 100%

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**Answer: B** — Total count IOA = (smaller count / larger count) × 100 = (45/50) × 100 = 90%
